On the 14th Feb 2012 my father Douglas Smith passed away. Amongst his many achievements was his lifelong passion and dedication to bell ringing at All Saints', Sedgley. He was a campanologist for 66 of his 83 years and the tower captain here at Sedgley for 37 years.

May his legacy be that the bells of All Saints' ring out for evermore.

It was a day that I will always remember and I hope the people of Sedgley enjoyed it as much as we, the ringers did.
