

"WHAT DOES THE LORD REQUIRE OF YOU"

The title of this article is taken from the Prophet Micah, "What does the Lord require of you, but that you should love justice and kindness and walk humbly with your God". So far so good, but what do these words have to do with the picture of a man dressed as a giraffe? Inside the costume is Armstrong Baillie who lives in Dundee. Twice a week he gets into his costume, and sets off

various places in Scotland to perform "random acts of kindness".

During the past six months Armstrong has handed out free bananas and water to runners at the Edinburgh Half Marathon, cleaned up litter on Portobello Beach and given away £10 vouchers to mothers in hospitals. He has also been seen handing out free coffee to cold passers-by and cleaning cages at cat and dog homes.

Armstrong is unemployed and earns money by busking which he then uses to pay for his good deeds. Interviewed on the BBC he said, "It makes me happy when I see the difference in people when they see me in the suit. It makes them happy and it makes me feel cheery. The reason I picked a giraffe is that I have always been interested in animals and giraffes are my favourite animal. Giraffes are like me, as my head is in the clouds but my heart is in the right place."

What Armstrong says supports the findings of Dr Barbara Mariposa, and the Memtal health Foundation, that when we are kind and pay attention to the needs of others endorphins like seretonins are released in the brain which make us feel good and relieve the symptoms of depression.

Now, I've no idea whether Armstrong Baillie, has any "religious" motive for what he does, I rather think not. He is simply being kind and generous because it benefits others and makes him feel good to.

Surely this is an attitude we should all try and emulate, though we may not choose to dress as a giraffe, as such behaviour not only reflects something of what Micah says God requires of us, but also reminds us of His "random acts of kindness" in giving us all that we need

GENERAL SYNOD REJECTED WOMEN BISHOPS JUST WHAT HAPPENED THAT DAY?

As everyone knows, The General Synod of the Church of England voted in late November to reject the draft legislation to allow women to become bishops. What exactly happened? Well, under the requirements of the Synod, the legislation required a two-thirds majority in each of the three voting houses for final draft approval.

Whilst more than two thirds voted for the legislation in both the House of Bishops (44-03) and the House of Clergy (148-45), the vote in favour of the legislation in the House of Laity was less than two-thirds (132-74). The vote in the House of Laity fell short of approval by 4 votes.

In total, 324 members of the General Synod voted to approve the legislation and 122 voted to reject it. The consequence of the "no" vote of terminating any further consideration of the draft legislation means that it will not be possible to introduce draft legislation in the same terms until a new General Synod comes into being in 2015, UNLESS the 'Group of Six' (the Archbishops, the Prolocutors and the Chair and Vice Chair of the House of Laity) give permission and report to the Synod why they have done so.

Speaking after the vote, the Rt Revd Graham James, Bishop of Norwich, said: "A clear majority of the General Synod voted in favour of the legislation to consecrate women as Bishops. But the bar of approval is set very high in this Synod. Two-thirds of each house has to approve the legislation for it to pass. This ensures the majority is overwhelming. The majority in the House of Laity was not quite enough.

"This leaves us with a problem. 42 out of 44 dioceses approved the legislation and more than three quarters of members of diocesan synods voted in favour. There will be many who wonder why the General Synod expressed its mind so differently. "The House of Bishops recognises that the Church of England has expressed its mind that women should be consecrated as bishops. There is now an urgent task to find a fresh way forward to which so many of those who were opposed have pledged themselves."

The day after the 'no' vote, the House of Bishops of the Church of England met in emergency session to consider the consequences of the vote. At the end of November The Archbishops' Council of the Church of England also met, when a substantial amount of time was given over to a discussion of the recent vote.

A statement read: "Many council members commented on the deep degree of sadness and shock that they had felt as a result of the vote and also of the need to affirm all women serving the church, both lay and ordained, in their ministries. In its discussions the Council decided that a process to admit women to the episcopate needed to be restarted at the next meeting of the General Synod in July 2013. There was agreement that the Church of England had to resolve this matter through its own processes as a matter of urgency. The Council therefore recommended that the House of Bishops put in place a clear process for discussions in the New Year, with a view to bringing legislative proposals before the Synod in July."

MOTHERS' UNION

We were delighted to have Revd. Heather Humphrey with us at our afternoon meeting in November. Heather had been to Oberammergau in 2010 and seen the Passion Play. In the early 1630's many people in Oberammergau died from the bubonic plague. The residents vowed that if God spared the rest of them from the plague they would produce a play every ten years, depicting the life and death of Jesus. The play is repeatedly performed over five months and involves over two thousand performers, all residents of the village. Heather showed us photographs of the beautiful tableaux, depicting stories from the Old Testament, which linked the scenes of the play. We heard how, when Jesus died on the cross, lightning flashed across the sky. This was a natural phenomenon, not stage-managed. The most moving scene was when the soldiers took the bodies of the two thieves down from the crosses, slinging them over their shoulders and dumping them, unceremoniously, on the ground. This was followed, in sharp contrast, with the great tenderness of Simon and the Marys, gently and lovingly lowering their Saviour to the ground. We had a most interesting afternoon and were pleased that Heather was able to come and share her memories of the Passion Play with us, after her illness in the summer.

'Corners of a Foreign Field' was the title of Barbara Price's talk to our evening meeting in November. Barbara reflected on the changing attitude to thewar through the poems of the war poets, before telling us of her own quest to find out what had happened to her mother's Uncle Bert, who died in the First World War, and whose name appears on our War Memorial in church. The poems we heard included John McRae's, 'In Flanders Fields', Rupert Brooke's 'The Soldier' and Laurence Binyon's 'For the Fallen' which has those well-known words used at the Remembrance Service'

'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning

We will remember them.'

Barbara told us how she researched the name Bert Hughes (her mother's Uncle Bert) in the war records and by process of elimination narrowed the matches down to two, one of whom was born and enlisted in Sedgley. This seemed to be her Bert except he had a grave and the family had always believed there was not one. Barbara decided to visit the grave but felt she wanted a sign that this was her relative. She booked to go to France and on the Sunday went to church to hear she had won the first prize of £100 in the Raffle – the cost of the trip. Still wanting another sign she bought a lottery ticket using the numbers 16/10/17 – the date Bert died. She went to France where she found the grave of Bert amidst rows of soldiers' graves, some with no name 'A soldier of the Great War – known unto God.' On her return she checked her lottery ticket and the numbers 16/10/17 had won her £10, so she had her second sign and was now certain she had the right grave. Visiting Bert's grave was a very emotional experience and one she has repeated several times, also visiting the Menin Gate where 54,000 names of those with no known grave are carved on the walls, and every night at 6pm the Last Post and Reveille are played to some 300 people. Thank you to Barbara (and her assistants) for a very interesting evening.

Every Jeweller should have a notice on view displaying hallmarks, or a list should be available on request. We heard how silver (The oldest form of currency) was originally 100% silver, but in 1920 onwards, silver was made up of 50% silver and 50% copper and in 1950 it became a mixture of copper and nickel.

We were given a demonstration of Victorian silver, all very beautiful, including a shoe horn, a Vesta match box, a cut glass pot with an engraved silver lid, a silver backed mirror and a silver handled button hook.

We then had the chance to wander round the wonderful display of jewellery that had been laid out for our inspection, much of which had been made by Joanne and Jessie. It was beautiful and on sale for very reasonable prices and everything was there! Bracelets, Necklaces, Earrings, and Brooches.

This collection of ten Christmas stories, retold with warmth and wisdom, includes a retelling of the Nativity story from the Gospels as well as tales and legends associated with Christmas traditions from around the world. Together these stories reflect the message of peace and goodwill at Christmas.

The large text and carefully managed readability mean that such a book is also great fun for young children who are learning to read. 

DECEMBER 6 ST NICHOLAS – PATRON SAINT OF CHILDREN

Father Christmas seems to be as old as Europe. Once he was Woden, lashing his rein-deer through the darkness of northern midwinter. Then he encountered the Church, and She transformed him into a saint, the much-loved Nicholas, Bishop of Myra (in south-west Turkey) in the fourth century. St Nicholas became the patron saint of children, and was given 6 December as his day. Since the 6th century St Nicholas has been venerated in both East and West, though virtually nothing is known of his life. Some believe he may have been one of the fathers at the Council of Nicea (325), imprisoned during the Emperor Diocletian's persecution.

According to legend, Nicholas was an extremely generous man. He revived three schoolboys murdered by an innkeeper in a tub of pickles. He rescued three young women from prostitution by giving their poverty-stricken father three bags of gold. (Hence the use of three gold balls as the pawnbroker's signs.)

Over the centuries many, including children, sailors, unmarried girls, pawnbrokers and moneylenders have claimed him as their patron. Perhaps it was on account of S Nicholas' generosity that in recent centuries children began to write little notes sometime before 6 December, to tell him about the toys they specially wanted. These notes were then left on the windowsill at night - or else on a ledge in the chimney.

But St Nicholas Day chanced to lie in the magnetic field of a much more potent festival, and after awhile his activities were moved towards Christmas. Then in Bavaria the children still left their notes on the window sill, but they addressed them to Liebes Christkind - Krishkinkle as they knew him - and the saint's part in the matter was simply to deliver the letters in heaven.

The most popular result of the cult of St Nicholas has been the institution of Santa Claus. He is based on Nicholas' patronage of children and the custom in the Low Countries of giving presents on his feast. Santa Claus has reached his zenith in America, where the Dutch Protestants of New Amsterdam (New York) united to it Nordic folklore legends of a magician who both punished naughty children and rewarded good ones with presents.

It soon became clear that Abdullah had a pleasant personality and the ability to learn in the right environment, however, he lacked social skills and was easily distracted. Within a few months in this specialised class, Abdullah had become more focused in his studies and more socially adept. He has made so much progress that he has even been able to join some of the mainstream classes and hold his own. His progress is a delight to the school and a great encouragement to his parents!


More than just a medal
