
# SEDGLEY'S OFFICE STORIES.

The plight of refugee children fleeing from the Spanish Civil War was discussed at Dudley Town Hall in 1937. 1937 was to have seen the coronation of **Edward VIII**, yet he abdicated, as he wished to marry a divorcee, Mrs Simpson making way for his brother **George VI**.



The Odeon Cinema opens on Castle Hill, Dudley. It opened on 28 July 1937 with 'The Beloved Enemy' starring Merle Oberon. The cinema seated 2,000. It is now used by Jehovah's Witnesses.

Full preparations are being made for any emergency at the Guest Hospital, Dudley, both for the protection of the hospital and for the reception of a large number of extra patients. A total of 246 extra beds are being put in, nearly trebling the accommodation. To do this, all the wards are being crowded with beds, some in the lecture rooms and other similar rooms. One large office is being transformed into a ward. The beds are being supplied by the Government. An additional staff of over 100 nurses is available for service. Many members of the VA.D. have been trained at the combast already. Large stocks of bandages, dressings and other materials for several months have been stored in the cellars in readiness for an emergency. The whole hospital is being so effective

### AIR RAID WARNINGS

Warning of a threatened air raid will be given by short intermittant blasts or a warbling note on sirens or hooters or by short blasts on police whistles. When you hear any of these sounds-take shelter. Stay there until the "Raider Passed "signal, a continuous note on sirens or hooters lasting two minutes. Gas attacks will be signalled by hand rattles. When the gas danger is over hand bolls will be sounded. When an air raid warning is given the driver of a motor vahicle must park at the side of the road, or in a garage, car park, or open space off the highway. If he is in a narrow busy read, he should turn into a side street. Moto cars must be left unlocked, and any articles of value removed. The driver and passengers should then go

The driver should not resume his journey until he hears the "Raiders Passed" signal, or if there has been a "Gas " warning, until the "All Clear" has been given by handbells. The driver of a vehicle carrying portol, explosives, or other dangerous or inflammable goods should, if possible, park in an open space away from the road.
