




Holidays at Home – a programme of entertainments on Dormston Playing Field in August 1945, was spoilt by the rain.

When the conflict was over, it was revealed how Dudley companies played an important role in the defence of the country - from making barrage balloons to manufacturing isotopes of uranium for the manufacture of the atomic bomb.

The release of prisoners following the end of the war with Japan brought welcome news to families. Gunner HD Foxall, Royal Artillery had been taken prisoner in Java in 1942 and only two cards had been received during this time, one of them just before VJ Day.


