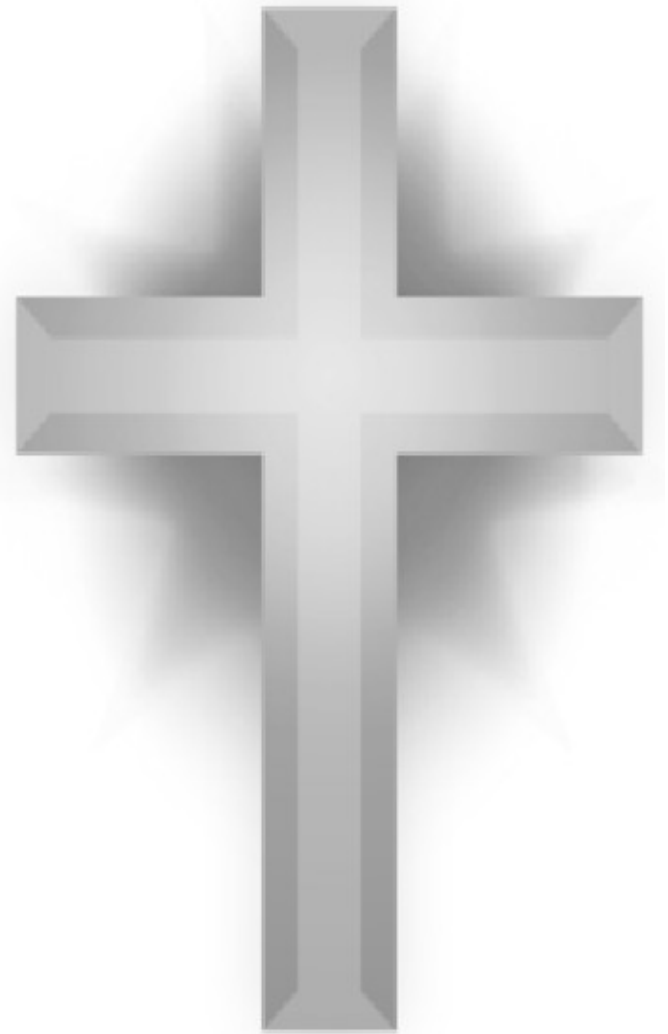

Vicars Ponderings #3 – Oct 2017 Worship



What is worship? The definition of worship is paying homage and reverent honour to a person; in Christianity, this reverent honour and homage is paid to God.

In the New Testament there are various words are used for worship. The word *proskuneo* "to worship" means to bow down to gods or kings. Throughout most of Christianity's history, corporate Christian worship has been liturgical, characterized by prayers and hymns, with texts rooted in, or closely related to Scripture, particularly the Psalter.

Being a musician one of my passions is musical worship. The church I came from in Coventry, and where I became a Christian, had a wide variety of worship styles from singing traditional hymns with a choir and organ to more contemporary worship songs with a band, in which I was of course the drummer!! We also had experimental services which the service leaders had pretty much a free hand in how the service was constructed and the feel of it; these could be anything from quiet contemplative services with lots of candles and Taizé style music, to quite lively band led services, to drama you name it we probably tried it!!

All this variety allowed people who preferred different styles and preferences to worship in a way that was true to their background, their personal music style preference, personality and it also enabled people to try alternative forms of worship that they had not experienced before. One of my favourite readings from the Psalter, is Psalm 150

Psalm 150

Praise for God's Surpassing Greatness

¹ Praise the **LORD!**

Praise God in his sanctuary;
praise him in his mighty firmament

² Praise him for his mighty deeds;
praise him according to his surpassing greatness!

³ Praise him with trumpet sound;
praise him with lute and harp!

⁴ Praise him with tambourine and dance;
praise him with strings and pipe!

⁵ Praise him with clanging cymbals;
praise him with loud clashing cymbals!

⁶ Let everything that breathes praise the **LORD!**
Praise the **LORD!**

I suppose, being a percussionist, I relate to it because of the cymbals and tambourines! Of course the writer of the Psalm was relating to instruments played in worship and culture of the day. So today, we could rewrite the Psalm and include all sorts of instruments, like guitars, keyboards, drum kits of course!, mouth organ, synthesizers, Oboe, piano, organ, djembe, the list, could go on!

The Psalmist first and foremost is exhorting exuberant praise, with passion, with everything we have.

Whether we worship in a quiet Taizé style or in a small village church, to cathedrals to a gathering of thousands, we are called to worship God with all our being, with all our heart, with all our soul.

God made us all different, no one person is the same as another, the variety is mind blowing! Humanity is like a kaleidoscope! And so it is with worship, we all worship God differently, in our own unique way.

I wonder, what does exuberant worship mean to you?

Someone I met recently said to me ‘welcome to the centre of the universe, the Black Country’.

I explained that I am licensed to our 3 churches in the parish of Gornal and Sedgley. He then said ‘welcome to the centre of the centre of the universe, Gornal’. Well I am not sure about all that but we are very happy to be here!

We ‘landed’ in Sedgley on the 14th August, and had a couple of weeks to unpack and prepare for my licensing service on the 3rd September, which was a wonderful day.

As we come to the end of our second week with you Jackie and I would like to say a huge thank you for the warmth of your welcome to the Gornal and Sedgley Team. Moving house and work at the same time is never without its pressures, but we are settling in well, not least of all because of your welcome.

I thought it might be the time to tell you something about ourselves. Before moving to the parish I was Chaplain to the Worcestershire Acute Hospitals NHS Trust – covering the Worcestershire Royal Hospital, Kidderminster Hospital and The Alexandra Hospital in Redditch. I have spent a challenging and deeply satisfying 4 years in that post, but have felt called by God to move on, and God led us to Gornal and Sedgley.

I was born in London, and raised in Cambridgeshire; I studied psychology in London, married Jackie in Worcestershire, lived and worked in London and became parent to 2 wonderful children! Our son James is married to Rachel – they have Abigail who is 2; and our daughter Ann-Marie who is married to Sam, and they have Caleb who is 2 and Faith who is 6 months. They all live close by which we are very glad about.

I worked as a Police Officer in London for many years; I was Curate for 3 years at St Andrew Sudbury in London Diocese, working as a self-supporting minister, before becoming Vicar of St Michael and All Angels Church in Harrow Weald. We were there for 14 years and saw God move in very wonderful ways to build the church up.

I am a spiritual director, love Ignatian spirituality and describe myself as an open evangelical. I enjoy supporting others as they explore their journey with God ...'

In 2013 I moved to my role as Hospital Chaplain. I am currently Bishop John's Advisor on Health Care Chaplaincy, and I support other Ministers in the Ministerial Development programme in our diocese.

Jackie is a Nurse Specialist in Worcestershire, working across the county. She trained and worked in London, but originally came from Coventry. We married in 1982 in Kidderminster after Jackie's Mum and Dad moved there.

A letter from The Archdeacon of Dudley

Nikki Groarke Archdeacon of Dudley

Have you ever had a moment when something from the Bible you know to be true, takes on a much deeper meaning, or impacts you at a deeper level?

This happened to me when I was privileged to attend a service in St Stephen's, Redditch celebrating the lives of transplant recipients, organ donors and their families. 'Gifts Beyond Price' was the brainchild of Elaine Whitfield, a relatively new member of the church, and she planned the most beautiful and moving event, attended, to her surprise, by people from all over the country. Elaine's father, Arthur, died in 2016. For the last twenty five years of his life, his blood was pumped around his body by a donor heart – he had benefitted from a transplant which had saved his life, and given him many more years than anticipated. It was this that Elaine wanted to express her thankfulness for, both to donor families, and to God.

In a profound symbolic act as part of the service, Natasha, recipient sixteen years ago of a donated heart and lungs when in her early twenties and close to death, lit eight candles, representing the lives one donor can save. Wendy, the mother of Jack, who died in a tragic accident last year, and whose organs were donated, then extinguished a large central candle, amidst hugs and tears, after speaking movingly to each other as representatives of each group, giving thanks for the lives involved. The Lead Retrieval Surgeon and Transplant Specialist from the QE hospital articulated some of the challenging dilemmas involved for his team, and both the joys, sorrows and weighty responsibility he experiences in making time sensitive decisions about life and death amidst tragedy. As a Muslim, he spoke powerfully about our shared humanity. The Reverend Paul Lawlor picked this up in his address too. Never have Jesus' words in John 15 had such resonance: "There is no greater love than this, that someone should lay down their life for their friends."

Jesus, in a sense, donated his life, that we might live life in all its fullness forever. Talking with many after the service who had received the gift of new life through the gift of a friend, or the death of a stranger, the love of God for each person he has made impacted me afresh. God so loved the world that he gave his Son

I resolved that day to live my life more fully, more gratefully, more aware of what it cost. I also spoke to my family making clear that should they ever be put in that awful place of decision, my bodily organs should, if possible, be used to bring life to others, as my life with God will continue into eternity, because Jesus laid down his life and lives in me.

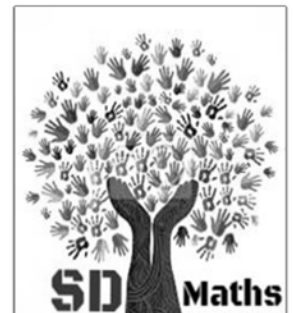

On the perils of trainers, high heels and soft shoes in church

My dear Nephew Darren

Having informed you of why clergy must always wear black shoes in church, my belief is that all those who hold any office in church should be similarly dressed.

Altar servers have the tendency to arrive wearing what I am informed are called trainers. Were they black it would be tolerable, but they seem to be without exception either brilliant white or luminous pink. When they arrive so attired I insist they remove them and serve in the sanctuary in their socks. Since our church floor is several degrees colder than permafrost, it normally takes them the rest of the morning with their feet in a bucket of hot water before circulation returns. They do not make that mistake a second time.

The rule applies to members of the choir also; my only concession is that ladies are allowed to wear shoes with heels. But that can present its own hazards. Miss Threlfall recently appeared in heels that, by chance, were the exact size and shape of the holes in our beautiful Victorian heating gratings in the nave floor. During the procession at the start of the Service, her heel wedged in one. She is a lady of some determination and refused to stop, thereby holding up the procession and letting the congregation know something was amiss. So she proceeded, now with a twelve inch square cast iron grid firmly attached to her foot. As she gallantly clanked up the aisle, rocking slightly since one leg was now several

stones heavier, one of our basses, completely innocent of what had happened, stepped into thin air. Half of his body disappeared vertically downwards as the other half proceeded in a horizontal easterly direction, scattering tenors like skittles. I continue to visit him in hospital.

Our organist arrives wearing black shoes, but once hidden in the organ loft, removes them and plays the organ in soft shoes. Or he did; these days he never removes his shoes at all. At Evensong on Sundays, my dog comes with me to swell the congregation and wanders round the church benignly as the Service progresses. After one Service, our organist came to retrieve his shoes only to find them missing. Their absence was inexplicable - until two weeks later when I found them buried in the Rectory rose garden.

Churchwardens, of course, know the rules for correct footwear - that is why they have been elected to serve in such a distinguished office - although I do feel that Admiral Hopkinson's practice of wearing white spats on top of his shoes when the bishop is here, a little excessive - even rather flash.

Maintaining this dress policy once you have your own church, will be maintaining the true faith.
